MPO

MPOs are required for populations over 50,000 and work to coordinate planning with a shared vision that crosses jurisdictions. It is a collaboration of partners including citizens, government and nonprofit.

It serves 5 main functions

1. Establishes a setting for decisions
2. Evaluates alternatives
3. Produces a long-term plan
4. Makes plan improvements
5. Involves the public

The typical structure of a MPO is a policy board with executive management and citizen advisory board (ad hoc committees as needed) with staff supporting. The technical committee oversees the work and projects with staff. The citizen advisory committee does the public engagement and are often appointed.

Decision making is bottom-up, informed by the citizen committee that is implementing public engagement.

Boundaries of the MPO are generally defined by the census track but you can also adjust using commuting data.
